The 2014 Windsor Orchid Society Orchid Show and Sale was another tremendous success for us to be proud of. Many of the vendors have already asked to be part of the next event and judges and exhibitors complimented our Society for the hospitality extended to them. We had AOS judges participate from Michigan, Ohio, New York and, of course, Toronto. Many thanks to Terry Kennedy for being our Head Judge at the Show and keeping everything in order.

We estimate that about 900 visitors came to enjoy the show and, it appeared, many didn't leave the building without an orchid or two in hand. The vendors were very pleased with the public response in the sales area and many of our visitors stopped on their way out to say how much they enjoyed the show. The photography session and the lectures held on Sunday were very well attended.



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Tips 'n Tricks by John Marcotte (OrchidsCanada.com)

The tips noted below are excerpts from the presentation John made to the WOS at the October, 2014 meeting. It represents only a portion of the tidbits of information that were part of his presentation. This will be continued in future issues of the WOS Newsletter.

----Rain water. There is just nothing as good. If you can't use rain water for all your plants, at least try to collect some for your plants that are in "hospital" and needing some extra TLC.

----ASA for Erwinia....325mg uncoated pill. Erwinia is a terrible bacterial disease that can consume a Paph or Phrag in a matter of days. It has a distinctive smell and looks like the plant's tissues are turning into black coffee, or tea inside the leaf. The entire portion that is affected must be removed whether it is a part of a leaf, a whole leaf, or a whole growth. Then, spray the entire plant with Aspirin water (one 325 mg uncoated aspirin dissolved into 1 litre of water). The ASA helps prompt the plant to muster all it's strength and be vigilant in fighting any further invasion of bacteria. This treatment saves about 9 out of 10 affected plants for me now, whereas before I would lose 9 out of 10 affected plants.

----Physan and Canadian Tire Pool chemical #3 in water. Physan; 1ml/50 litre. Pool chemical #3 - 5%; 3 ml per gallon. My greenhouse is humid and often too wet late in the day. Also, it is certainly NOT a sterile environment, having an earth floor and open vents in the summer. So, there is plenty of opportunity for micro-pathogens to live and thrive. To prevent most troubles, I add a very tiny amount of Physan to my water, all the time. I use it at 1 ml per 50 litres of water. That's not very much! But, it helps a lot in preventing spontaneous outbreaks of wet rot. In Canada, Physan can be hard to get; so, you can use the Canadian Tire Pool Algaecide #3 (5% concentrate) at the rate of 3 ml's per gallon.

-----Urea Nitrogen is best for quick green-up. Got a pale plant? Try foliar spraying with a Urea based Nitrogen fertilizer. Urea is taken up by plants the easiest via the leaves. Miracle Grow is a good choice.

----Feed with high Phosphorous (10-52-10), twice. Then, use high Nitrogen (28-14-14), or high Potasium (7-11-27), 4 times, depending on whether or not you're trying to promote foliage or flowering. Basically, the first number (of the 3 major nutrients), listed on a fertilizer package is Nitrogen, which assists in foliage growth. The second number is Phosphorous, which is a growth stimulant. So, it's good to promote rooting, foliage growth, or flowering/fruiting. The third number is Potassium. This is what's used by plants to do a good job of blooming and growing fruits. While you cannot force a plant to do a wonderful job of blooming out of it's normal season simply by adding flowering fertilizers, you can help it to do a wonderful job by providing the right stimulus and nutrients at the right time. In the spring, when most plants are experiencing the stimulating effects of more sunlight and beginning to have a foliage growth spurt, you should feed a high Phosphorous feed (example: 10-52-10) a couple times in a row to jolt the plant into growth mode, which will be supported by the longer days and stronger sunlight of the season. However, that's not good enough by itself. Then, you have to help the plant figure out what to do next and help it to do a really good job. So, then you switch to a high first number (example: Nitrogen 28-14-14), for 3 or 4 feedings. Now that the plant's been stimulated to grow, the Nitrogen helps it grow lots of strong and healthy new foliage. As the plant's natural blooming season approaches, switch from using high Nitrogen to using a high 3rd number fertilizer (example: Potassium 10-10-27). As the environmental conditions trigger a blooming response, you will now be providing some stimulation (high middle number, twice) as well as the right nutrients for growing strong flowers (high third number, 3 or 4 times).

----Epsom salts in summer (equal volume to NPK fertilizer). Sunlight breaks down chlorophyll. Chlorophyll is what makes plants green and it is essential for a plant to survive and be healthy. However, since sunlight breaks down the Chlorophyll molecule inside the cells of plants, they need to keep making more. The central atom in chlorophyll is Magnesium. Epsom Salts are magnesium sulphate. Green up plants that are "bleaching" in bright light by adding epsom salts to your fertilizer solution at the same rate you use your other fertilizers. For example: If I you put ½ teaspoon of fertilizer into 4 litres of water, you should also add ½ teaspoon of Epsom Salts as well. This is only necessary when plants are getting strong light, or if you are using rain water or R.O. water exclusively.
